IMPORTANT QUESTIONS AND STORY DISCUSSION

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Overview of the Play:

Macbeth is a **tragic play** by **William Shakespeare**. It is about a man named **Macbeth**, who is a brave soldier, but his desire for power leads to his **downfall**.

6. **Macduff** – Macduff is a **Scottish nobleman**. He is very angry at Macbeth for killing his family. Macduff eventually **kills Macbeth** in the final battle, bringing **justice** for Macbeth's crimes.

The Story of Macbeth:
